

## Lake Winona Information

Welcome to the Lake Winona community of homeowners and occasional guests on a quiet 148 Acre Lake.

- Please be aware that sounds travel around the lake especially at night. Please be considerate of your neighbors and not set off fireworks.
- Our 148-acre lake is classified as Class A water and is tested annually. Please remember to use only non-phosphorus/ lake safe cleaning products during your stay. Brands include: 7th generation, Simple Green and Mrs. Myers. Check other product labels.
- Please do not bathe, wash dogs, boats or other objects in the lake.

### Loons

- We are fortunate to have loons on the lake. There is a Floating Nest Raft on the lake designed to protect loon eggs and offspring from predators. The nests are vulnerable to flooding caused by wake from boats. Please do not approach the loons, the nest nor boat near the nest.

### Boating

- Motor boating is permitted on Lake Winona but not Jet skis.
- Both islands are private property and are not for public use.
- New Hampshire has a mandatory boating education law. Everyone 16 years of age and older who operates a motorboat over 25 horsepower on New Hampshire waters must have a boating education certificate. <https://www.nh.gov/safety/divisions/nhsp/fob/marine-patrol/boating-education>
- Please ski or tube one-way, counter clockwise and never around or between the two islands.
- If you bring your own boat please inspect and remove from your boat and related equipment any plant material and discard in the trash.
- Lake Winona connects to Lake Waukegan via the Snake River that can be traveled by kayak or canoe only. It is best to try this in the spring in a boat without a skeg. The adventure requires a portage over a beaver dam.
- Please be sure to have a life jacket/ Personal Flotation Device/ PFD in the boat for each person. NH Marine patrol regularly visits our lake and has been known to stop and check.

- Lake Winona is known for rainbow trout and also smallmouth bass and other fish species.
